The scripture lessons this morning ask us to consider what it means to follow Christ. The passage from Isaiah contains the promise that “the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shined.” Paul, in his letter to the church in Corinth, addresses the divisions within the community and appeals for unity among the people there. Paul believes the cross of Christ unifies, and he is impatient with the ongoing divisions among Christ’s followers. In Matthew’s gospel, Jesus proclaims a message of repentance when he encounters Peter, Andrew, James, and John, each of whom drop everything to follow Jesus.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

This morning we welcome the Rev. Heidi Neumark as a Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson Distinguished Guest Preacher. Rev. Heidi Neumark currently serves Trinity Lutheran Church of Manhattan (ELCA). Trinity is a multicultural, bilingual community with ministries that include: Mujeres en Progreso, a Latina support group; the Creative Learning Center after-school program; and Trinity Place, a shelter for homeless LGBT youth, and Elmo, the turtle. For the previous nineteen years, Heidi was pastor of Transfiguration Lutheran Church in the South Bronx. She was a founding member of South Bronx Churches, an ecumenical community organizing group that has trained local leaders, built hundreds of low-cost homes, and established a top ranked public high school. In addition to being a parish pastor, Heidi preaches and speaks at events around the country. She also enjoys writing. Her experiences in congregational and community ministry in the Bronx led to a highly acclaimed book, *Breathing Space: A Spiritual Journey in the South Bronx* (Beacon Press). Presently, Heidi is working on a book about her discovery of Jewish roots and her grandfather's death at a concentration camp. Heidi is married to Gregorio Orellano, and they are the parents of Ana and Hans.

TODAY'S FLOWERS—The flowers for the worship service today are given to the glory of God by the Erlenbach Family Trust.



CHILD LABOR DOCUMENTARY AND PHOTO EXHIBIT—"Stolen Childhoods" is a documentary on child labor that will be shown on Monday, January 24, at 7:00p.m. in Duke Chapel. The film follows children working in diverse industries such as fishing, brickmaking, and agriculture. Following the screening, audience members will be invited to participate in a Q&A session about child labor with Suzanne Shanahan, associate director of the Kenan Institute for Ethics, and Charles D. Thompson of the Center for Documentary Studies. In conjunction with the film screening, the Chapel is hosting "Faces of Freedom," a traveling photo exhibition documenting the lives and working conditions of children employed in rug factories in India, Nepal, and Pakistan. The exhibit is cosponsored by the U.S. Fund for UNICEF and GoodWeave, a nonprofit organization that works to end illegal child labor in the rug industry and to offer educational opportunities to children in South Asia. The photos will be on display in the Chapel sanctuary from January 20 through February 24, 2011. Both the film screening and the photo exhibition are free and open to the public.

ORGAN RECITAL NEXT SUNDAY—Chapel Organist David Arcus will perform a free organ recital next Sunday, January 30, at 5:00 p.m. in Duke Chapel. The recital will include works by Liszt, Schumann, Alain, and Dupré.
