In the lesson from First Kings, Elijah spends 40 days wandering in the desert and has a dramatic encounter with thunder, lighting, and earth-quake atop Mt. Horeb (another name for Mt. Sinai). The story seems to suggest that God shows up in the silence, but a closer looks reveals this too fails to provide Elijah the comfort of the presence of God. Like the man from Geresa, in the gospel lesson from Luke, when one finally encounters the presence of God, evil is dismantled, community is established, and silence is merely an option.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel.

Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.
