In today's Old Testament passage Amos expresses the grief and outrage of God, whose beloved people are not leading lives worthy of his hopes for them—they have trampled the needy and ruined the poor. Amos tells of a time when all of Israel's longings for God will be met with silence, in the same way they have met the cries of the needy with silence. Yet in his letter to the church in Colossae, Paul emphasizes that Christ is creator and redeemer of all the world, despite human disobedience. Luke's gospel tells the story of Martha who becomes irritated with her sister Mary for spending time with Jesus instead of helping around the house. Jesus responds that Mary has chosen the better part by choosing hospitality over distraction and worry.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

This morning we are pleased to welcome the Rev. Vernon Tyson as our Peter Gomes Guest Preacher. The Rev. Tyson comes from a long line of United Methodist ministers (he is brother to five United Methodist ministers). He is a graduate of Guilford College and Duke Divinity School, and he has an honorary doctorate from Methodist University in Fayetteville. He spent 42 years as a Methodist minister in Eastern NC, including appointments at Edenton Street UMC in Raleigh and University UMC in Chapel Hill, as well as serving the Wilmington district as a District Superintendent. Since "retirement," he has served as interim minister in eight churches and just finished serving Elevation UMC in Johnston County earlier this month. He is married to the former Martha Buie of Biscoe, NC. They have four grown children and four grandchildren.
