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In last week's scripture lesson, Job cries out in anguish to God. This week, God is no longer hidden, and he answers Job by leading him on a tour through creation. While at first glance it may not seem to answer Job's suffering, in fact, God seeks to offer some assurance that there is an order to creation and that he is not capricious, even if humans do not always understand his ways. In the gospel lesson from Mark, Jesus continues to turn upside down and reorder his disciples' expectations by saying, "Whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all."
