

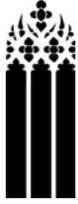

Today's scripture lessons have an apocalyptic emphasis. The passage from Isaiah speaks of God creating a new heaven and earth, a kingdom characterized by peace and abundance, not distress and weeping. In the letter to the people of Thessalonica, Paul encourages faithful discipleship and right living during the in-between times, under the assumption that the end of the world was near. Jesus' words in Luke describe the turmoil of the world; wars, plagues, and famine were as relevant then as they are now. Yet, he offers assurance that despite difficulty, "not a hair of your head will perish."

FLOWERS—Today's flowers are given to the glory of God in loving memory of Sarah Mae and William E. Massey by their family.


