The tradition as understood at Duke Chapel is that the Holy Spirit makes Christ fully present in both the bread and the wine. If you receive only the bread, be assured that you are nonetheless in full communion with Christ and the Church.

If you would like to receive individual anointing with oil and prayers for healing, ministers will be in the Memorial Chapel during communion.

Today's Offering—The Mission of the Month for November is Stop Hunger Now, a Raleigh-based international hunger relief agency that has been fulfilling its commitment to end hunger for over 10 years. Stop Hunger Now has coordinated the distribution of food and other lifesaving aid to children and families in countries all over the world. In 2005, it created a meal packaging program. The program perfected the assembly process that combines rice, soy, dehydrated vegetables, and a flavoring mix including 21 essential vitamins and minerals into small meal packets. This year Stop Hunger Now expects to package nearly 5.5 million meals, which will be delivered through school-lunch programs in over 65 countries. Please join our support of this valuable ministry.
