Today we celebrate the Baptism of our Lord. The Epiphany season marks the "revealing" of Christ, and traditionally marks three events: the visit of the magi, Jesus' baptism, and his transformation of water into wine at Cana, which John describes as "the first of the signs through which he revealed his glory." Today's passage from Isaiah speaks of a servant, God's chosen, in whom God's soul delights: "I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations." In the passage from Acts, Peter describes the good news that Jesus was chosen to bring salvation to all people, not just Israel. The gospel describes Jesus' baptism by John in the Jordan.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will also be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

PRESENTATION OF THE CANDIDATE


