

In today's gospel lesson, Luke tells the parable of the Good Samaritan. Because "Samaritan" has become a well-known term to refer to do-gooders, some of the original shock of the message is lost. In Jesus' time, Samaritans were a despised ethnic minority. Yet in this parable, the Samaritan is held up as an example of one who understands what it means to be a neighbor. Today we honor the witness of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., recalling his conviction that "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." Our service includes a litany in memory of those who lit the path of freedom.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

This morning we welcome the Rev. Dr. Richard Lischer as a Bishop W. Kenneth Goodson Distinguished Guest Preacher. Dr. Lischer is James T. and Alice Mead Cleland Professor of Preaching in Duke Divinity School, where he has been a member of the faculty since 1979. An ordained Lutheran clergyman, he served parishes in Illinois and Virginia before coming to Duke. In much of his writing he has focused on the uniqueness of the proclaimed gospel among the discourses of the world. He also has explored the interactions of preaching, politics and contemporary culture, notably in *The Preacher King: Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Word that Moved America*. Professor Lischer was recently honored with a lifetime achievement award by the Academy of Homiletics. He lives with his wife, Tracy, in Orange County.


