As the journey into the season of Lent continues, the intentional self-reflection and penitence prods us to more fully become a people after God's heart. In the Sermon on the Mount, we catch a glimpse of God's heart. Jesus names as "blessed" those who may be heavy-laden in the wilderness—those who are poor in spirit, pure in heart, seeking after peace, and suffering persecution. The rhythms of the liturgical calendar provide space for wilderness wandering, and the Sermon on the Mount reminds us that Christ draws close to those whose spirits are weary and weak.



ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we welcome Archbishop Elias Chacour as our Sterly and Pelham Wilder distinguished guest preacher. Chacour is a Melkite Catholic priest and a three-time Nobel Peace Prize nominee known for his work promoting peace among Palestinians and Israelis. Chacour was a boy when the state of Israel was declared in 1948. His book, *Blood Brothers*, captures his memories of the beginnings of the Israeli/Palestinian conflict and shares his life journey as a peacemaker. In 1994, Father Chacour received the prestigious World Methodist Peace Award that has been presented in the past to such pilgrims for peace as former U.S. President Jimmy Carter and the late Egyptian President Anwar el-Sadat. In 2001, he was the recipient of the Niwano Peace Prize.

Archbishop Chacour is president and founder of Mar Elias Educational Institutions in the Galilee area of northern Israel. The school system serves nearly 4,000 young people, from kindergarten through college, from the major faith traditions in that area of the world, including Christians, Muslims, Jews and Druze. As Archbishop, he is head of the largest Christian community in Israel, with about 50,000 members.

“Peace needs no contemplators,” Chacour said in a recent talk. “It needs actors, persons who are willing to get their hands dirty, to be salt and light, connecting people with each other and to God.”
