The gospel lesson on the second Sunday of Easter each year is the story of "Doubting Thomas," Jesus' disciple who refused to believe the other disciples' account of Jesus' resurrection without seeing it for himself. The placement of this story of incredulity immediately following the joy of Easter acknowledges the complexity of belief. The Easter season, with its emphasis on new beginnings and new life, is traditionally a time for baptism. Today we welcome a baby boy into the Church through the sacrament of baptism, and fifteen people will be joining the Congregation at Duke Chapel.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we are pleased to welcome Thomas G. Long as the Sterly and Pelham Wilder, Jr. distinguished guest preacher. The Rev. Dr. Long, a Presbyterian minister, is the Bandy Professor of Preaching at Candler School of Theology at Emory University in Atlanta. He has previously taught preaching at Princeton, Columbia, and Erskine Seminaries. He is the author of several books on preaching and worship as well as biblical commentaries on Matthew and Hebrews. He served as the senior homiletics editor of *The New Interpreter's Bible*. His latest books are *The Witness of Preaching, Second Edition* (Westminster John Knox, 2005), *Accompany Them with Singing: The Christian Funeral* (2009), and *Preaching from Memory to Hope* (2009). His wife, Kimberly, also a Presbyterian minister, is professor of worship at Columbia Theological Seminary in Atlanta. She has long been involved in inter-religious dialogue and is now cooperating with the Episcopal Church of Sudan to develop theological education, community health, and sustainable agriculture.
