The lectionary passages today portray the new things that God is doing in Christ. The passage in Acts describes Peter's vision of God granting permission to eat ritually unclean animals. Although contrary to the Jewish cultural norms, it allowed Peter to share table fellowship with Gentiles, who were being enfolded into the people of God through their faith in Jesus. Revelation paints a beautiful image of a new Jerusalem, where God will dwell among his people, where death and mourning will be no more, and where all things will be made new. In John, Jesus gives a new commandment, simple yet profoundly challenging, "that you love one another."

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

The Rt. Rev. Dr. John Inge was appointed Bishop of Huntingdon in 2003. Before his consecration, Bishop Inge served in the diocese as a Residentiary Canon of Ely from 1996 where he had responsibility for education and mission at the Cathedral. He became Vice Dean in 1999.

Bishop Inge read theology and chemistry at the University of Durham in England, and he studied for the priesthood at the College of the Resurrection Mirfield in Yorkshire. After his ordination in 1984, he began his ministry as a school chaplain, first as Assistant Chaplain at Lancing College and later as Chaplain at Harrow School. In 1990, he became Vicar of Wallsend St Luke, in the heart of industrial Tyneside. During his time in the Diocese of Newcastle, he also chaired the Board for Mission and Social Responsibility.

Bishop Inge is married to Denise, a writer, whose most recent publication is an anthology of the works of the 17th century priest and poet, Thomas Traherne. They have two young daughters. He also enjoys reading, drama, music and travel. His book, *A Christian Theology of Place*, was published in 2003.

TODAY'S MISSION OF THE MONTH OFFERING—Today's mission of the month is Partners for Youth (PFY), a mentoring program for 14- to 19-year old students based in southwest central Durham. PFY strives to create long-term relationships and high-quality enrichment activities that affect every aspect of the students' lives. Their goal is to support and motivate students as they develop their aspirations for the future and the skills they will need to become successful members of the community. PFY surrounds each of the 25 students in the program with four mentors: an adult mentor from the community, a Duke student mentor, a teacher at their school, and an adult mentor as a summer internship. PFY was founded in 1998 as part of the Duke-Durham Neighborhood Partnership, an initiative focused on improving the quality of life in the neighborhoods and public schools near Duke's campus. It became an independent nonprofit organization in March 2004.

TODAY'S GUEST CHOIR—The Youth Choir of First Baptist Church of Greensboro is made up of 50 boys and girls, ages 12-15, who lead music in worship on the first Sunday of each month. The choir's literature reflects a variety of sacred music sung in the evangelical tradition. Every two years the group takes an out-of-state summer that involves a combination of musical performance and mission work. The choir is directed by the Associate and Assistant Pastors for Music and Worship, Douglas and Terri Vancil.
