Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost in the western liturgical calendar. Today we celebrate the doctrine of the Holy Trinity—God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Christian understanding of God as the unity of three persons in one God is one of the profound mysteries of Christian faith. The language around the Trinity emerged in the early church as early as 180 A.D. when Theopolis of Antioch used it to refer to "God, his Word, and his Wisdom." Tertullian used it two decades later to refer specifically to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we welcome the Reverend Dr. Jason Byassee as our guest preacher. Dr. Byassee received his doctorate in theology in 2005 from Duke's Graduate School of Religion. He is currently an assistant editor at *The Christian Century* and instructor of theology at Garrett Evangelical Seminary in Illinois. Dr. Byassee has also taught at North Park Theological Seminary, Wheaton College, and Northern Seminary. He is the author of three books: *Reading Augustine: A Guide to the Confessions* (Cascade, 2006); *Praise Seeking Understanding: Reading the Psalms with Augustine* (forthcoming, Eerdmans); and *An Introduction to the Desert Fathers* (forthcoming, Cascade). Dr. Byassee is a minister in the United Methodist Church. He is married to Jaylynn, and the couple has two boys, Jack and Sam. Their third child is due in early July.
