

Today we celebrate the passing from death to life through baptism and confirmation. Today's lesson from First Kings addresses desperation in a whole country in face of famine, and desperation in a family in the face of a child's death. Luke's story echoes the same desperation as it describes another widow's grief over the death of her son. In both stories, just as in baptism, God brings life out of death.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

BAPTISM

May God, who has received you by baptism into his Church, pour upon you the riches of his grace, that within the company of Christ's pilgrim people you may daily be renewed by his anointing Spirit, and come to the inheritance of his saints in glory. Amen.

CONFIRMATION

Almighty and ever-living God, you have given your servants new birth in baptism by water and the Spirit, and have forgiven them all their sins.
