The theme of abundance and hospitality is a common thread in the scripture lessons this morning. In Jeremiah, God speaks to the fruitfulness of the land that was offered to the people of Israel out of his tenderness and love for them. The Hebrews passage encourages mutuality of love, sharing of resources, and caring for strangers as a way to live faithfully in Christian community. Luke's parable of the wedding banquet turns traditional notions of power upside-down as Jesus calls on his disciples to extend radical hospitality, welcoming as friends those people on the fringes of society into the very center of the celebration.




### TUESDAY EVENING COMMUNION AND HEALING
