Today marks the tenth anniversary of the attacks of September 11, 2001. Our service opens with a solemn procession in memory of the lives lost that day. Thirty members of the university community bear white roses, representing the nearly 3000 who died. Six Duke alums carry white roses tinged with blue delphinium, in memory of the six Duke alumni killed. Today's sermon, litany and anthems express and reflect on different aspects of the day's legacy.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.


