We are delighted to welcome former Dean of Duke Chapel, Bishop Will Willimon, as our preacher today. Our gospel reading comes in four scenes. In scene one, we have a very wealthy man and a manager who is very wealthy too. In scene two the rich man hears that the manager is squandering the property and straightaway fires him. But there is a moment of grace: the manager gets the chance to visit all the rich man's clients to settle up their accounts. In scene three, the manager sets about writing off the debts of the rich man's major creditors. It's too late to make money, but it's not too late to build social capital. He starts making friends, people who will be pleased to see him even when he's out of a job. In scene four, the rich man congratulates the manager for making friends rather than extorting money, and realizing that generosity is the best investment.

Dr. Willimon is Bishop of the North Alabama Conference of the United Methodist Church. He was Dean of Duke Chapel from 1984-2004. He is the author of 60 books, including *The Sermons of Will Willimon* (Westminster John Knox). He edited *Sermons from Duke Chapel* (Duke University Press), a collection of 75 years of Chapel sermons. He and his wife, Patsy, have two adult children, William and Harriet, who grew up attending Duke Chapel. Harriet and her husband, Garrett Putman, live in Durham with their sons, Will and Wesley.
