


Photo of the Chapel under construction, 1931

Chapel Dean Sam Wells will lead the congregation through the Litany of Commemoration. The Chapel service will continue as usual at 11:00 a.m. The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.
