The people of God are not exempt from hardship. Today's scripture lessons speak to God's faithfulness in the midst of difficulty. The prophet Joel speaks of the renewing presence of God, who will bring rain to dry earth and who will replenish the people of Israel. 2 Timothy portrays Paul nearing the end of his life, and reflecting on his journey, noting how the Lord stood by him and gave him strength, even when others deserted him. The reading from Luke contrasts the obedient Pharisee whose pride keeps him from understanding God's grace with the tax collector whose shame and humility allowed him to be welcomed by God.

ALL SAINTS SERVICES AT DUKE CHAPEL

This Thursday is All Saints Day, which is a time for the Church to remember all those saints, known and unknown, who have gone before us and have faithfully walked the Christian path. Christian communities have been honoring martyrs and saints in their worship as far back as the fourth century, but in the early 700s such rituals were formalized to be celebrated annually on November 1. There are two broad strands of the worship tradition of All Saints, both of which are offered at Duke Chapel in the coming week. The All Hallows Eve service on October 31 is a service that is contemplative and solemn in nature, allowing quiet reflection in the midst of the a cappella offering of the Vespers Ensemble. The ensemble will also lead the regular Vespers service on November 1 at 5:15 p.m. All Saints Day will also be celebrated next Sunday during the 11:00 a.m. worship service. The mood of this service represents the second strand, one of celebration and joy for all those people who have borne fruit for the kingdom by their service to Christ. The service will feature the Duke Jazz Ensemble. Next week is also Duke's Parents' and Family Weekend, so there may be a large number of visitors.
