CHAPEL ANNOUNCEMENTS

TODAY'S FLOWERS—The flowers in the Memorial Chapel are provided by the Duke Alumni Association in memory of Duke alumni who died in the last year. NEXT WEEK AT DUKE CHAPEL—On April 19 and 20 the Chapel will host performances of Benjamin Britten's *War Requiem*. Because of the 300+ person choir and orchestra, the sanctuary will be modified to accommodate the choirs and instruments--most of the chairs at the front will be removed, and both transepts will have limited space. A SPECIAL NOTE ABOUT WORSHIP ON MAY 11—Sunday May 11 is Duke's graduation weekend, and the Chapel will not be worshipping at its regular 11:00 a.m. time. Instead, the worship service will be at 5:00 p.m. It is Pentecost Sunday, which will be marked with a colorful procession, baptisms, and confirmation of youth from the Congregation. The Rev. Peter Gomes, Plummer Professor of Christian Morals and Pusey Minister at Harvard, will be preaching.

At this meeting, we will have the good fortune of hearing from Pastor Leon Dorleans, who works with Family Health Ministries in Haiti. The trip will run from October 11-19, 2008.
