Our service begins with a procession of the to recall the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. The palms we wave reflect the fragility of the celebration—since a mere five days later the crowd's adulation turned to hatred. We also read Paul's summary of Jesus' ministry in Philipians. In careful phrases, Paul succinctly sums up the humiliation and the glory of Jesus that we prepare to honor this week. The gospel narrative will be a re-telling of the passion of Christ, drawing from all four gospels.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

Today we welcome the Rev. Peter J. Gomes as the Sterly and Pelham Wilder Distinguished Guest Preacher. Born in Boston in 1942, Professor Gomes is an American Baptist minister ordained to the Christian Ministry by the First Baptist Church of Plymouth, Massachusetts. Since 1970 he has served in the Memorial Church, Harvard University, and since 1974 as Plummer Professor of Christian Morals and Pusey Minister in the Memorial Church. A member of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences and of the Faculty of Divinity of Harvard University, Professor Gomes holds degrees from Bates College (A.B., 1965), from the Harvard Divinity School (S.T.B., 1968), and thirty honorary degrees. Professor Gomes is widely regarded as one of America's most distinguished preachers. He is a visiting professor this semester at Duke and UNC under the Nannerl Keohane Distinguished Visiting Professorship award.
