Sometimes the workings of God remain unseen before they bear fruit—similar to a seed growing and taking root in the soil. In the Old Testament reading, Samuel trusts God's choice of the young shepherd David as king, because he discerned that God would use David to sow the seed for Israel's future. In his second letter to the Corinthian church, Paul also emphasizes that discipleship involves walking by faith, not by sight. In Mark, Jesus uses the image of seeds to describe the mysterious and hidden nature of God's kingdom.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will also be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER

This morning we welcome the Rev. Dr. William Jennings as our guest preacher. Dr. Jennings is currently Associate Professor of Theology and Black Church Studies at Duke Divinity School. For many years, Dr. Jennings served as the Academic Dean of the Divinity School. Dr. Jennings was born and raised in Grand Rapids, Michigan where he attended the New Hope Missionary Baptist Church. Dr. Jennings received his B.A. in Religion and Theological Studies from Calvin College (1984), his M.Div. from Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California, and his Ph.D. from Duke University. The author of numerous articles, Dr. Jennings has just completed a book entitled *The Remade World: The Redemption of the Christian Social Imagination* which will be published by Yale Press next spring. Dr. Jennings also serves along with his wife, the Rev. Joanne L. Browne Jennings as associate ministers at the Mount Level Baptist Church in Durham, North Carolina. The Jennings are the parents of two daughters, Njeri and Safiya Jennings.
